Club Beginnings - David Anderson

Back in mid-1988 Dick Hodge was selling a Royal Enfield Turbo Twin, so he placed an advert on the community Sales Board in Safeway supermarket in Ayr. Two people came to see it, they were Douglas Stanley and Peter McCrorie

Peter already had a Tiger Cub and Dougie was looking for a bike to get back into motorcycling, but he didn't buy Dick's bike. As they were leaving Dick remarked that he thought there was maybe enough interest to form a local club, Peter said "Well why don't you go ahead and do it"

Dick booked a meeting room in the County Hotel and put an advert in the Ayrshire Post and phoned a few of his motorcycling pals. The response to the Post advert was very encouraging with lots of phone calls expressing interest.

On the advertised meeting night, around 20 people showed up at the County Hotel. Amongst those were Dick Hodge, Neville Stone, Graham Bisset, Bob Blackley, Jimmy Morton, Ian McKenzie, Grant Allan, Ian McClue, John Sykes, David Anderson, Dave Moffat, Campbell McCreath, Andy McGavin, and Jack Telfer.

Officials appointed then were Chairman, Neville Stone with Dick Hodge as Vice Chairman, Secretary, Douglas Stanley, and Treasurer Peter McCrorie who opened our bank account with the Dunfermline Building Society.

We decided from the start that monthly meetings would be in the County Hotel on the first Tuesday of each month. The first ever Regular Meeting was on November the 16th 1988 and there were 10 people present. Those were Dick Hodge, Douglas Stanley, Peter McCrorie, David Anderson, Harry Cochrane, Neville Stone, Graham Bissett, Bob Blackley, lan McKenzie, and Grant Allan.

In July 1989 the council sponsored an event at the Dam Park Hall called "Wheels 89" and a good few bikes were exhibited, also it involved a bike cavalcade from Prestwick shore to Dam Park Hall.

The photo which was taken at Prestwick by Dick's pal shows Graham Bissett, Dick on Velocette 350 Mac with David Anderson BSA behind. The BSA Bantam at the left was ridden by Evelyn Scott of Barrhill.

That event gave us the idea of having our own Classic Bike Show and we held the first one in Dam Park Hall in June 1990.

Club Accounts 2021 -2022 - Stuart Miller

AYR CLASSIC MOTORCYCLE CLUB

These are the accounts for Ayr Classic Motorcycle Club covering the 1st November 2021 to 31st October 2022 accounting period. They include the costs of holding the Annual Dinner in 2022 but not the deposit to Ayr Racecourse for the 2020 Scottish Classic Motorcycle Show, this was shown in the 2018/19 accounts and has been carried over to 2023.

Summary of Club's Accounts for 2021-2022 (2020 - 2021 figures in brackets)

The Club accounts were checked by the Auditor and found to be correct.

The Club continues to have a healthy Bank Balance of £13,684.76 (£14,366.33) though a decrease of £681.57 (decrease of £561.02). In addition, the Club is holding cash in hand of £134.43 (£108.74).

The deficit for the year was £655.88 (Deficit £632.87).

There were no Show Costs in this period £0 (£0).

We continue to show a healthy bank balance for a club, the committee has managed expenditure to best of ability with outgoing in the main limited to required items and committed expenses.

A review of the Club accounts reveal the following:-

Club Income - £2,879.02 (£1,047.85).

- Subscription income at £2,078.79 (£1,047.85) shows a major increase due to increase in membership cost, our Membership Secretary keeping the membership numbers accurate and stable year on year with a number of new members this year and the use of PayPal payments through the website accounting for 37 (32) members.
- 2. We received £200 from the Motor Show for use of our barriers, thanks to the members who worked to arrange and repair these.
- 3. No Show income has been reflected in the overall Club income.

Club Expenditure - £3,534.90 (£1,690.72).

- Show costs were £0. Ayr Racecourse have been good enough to allow the transfer of the £300 deposit to 2023.
- 2. We made a £50 donation to the Ayrshire Hospice after we had their collection buckets on our stand at the Burns Centre and a £50 donation to the Glenburn Miners Club.
- The Club Christmas Dinner was held in February 2022 at a cost to the club of £386.00
- 4. BMF affiliation fees are due in December as normal.
- 5. Club merchandise purchases accounted for £444.87 (£0)
- 6. Club nights and meetings cost £413.18 (£70) with increased numbers attending
- 7. Our webpage and miscellaneous expenses cost £1,167.45 (£1,168.72).

My Motorbike, 1950 Ariel VG500 - Malcolm Rodgers

Registered on the 27th May 1950 in Bristol, my VG was the last of the line of the "instrument in tank" bikes produced by the Ariel Motorcycle Co, Selly Oak, Birmingham. In fact, the VG500 was deleted from their listings in the same year. The VG was the overhead valve equivalent of the VB 600, side valve machine, which were ostensibly used as sidecar tugs.

My particular VG, was discovered in a coal bunker, partly dismantled in the late eighties and had remained in the first owner's ownership since 1950. Sympathetically restored by a gentleman on the Isle of Wight, all of the paint and chrome wear and tear was retained which gives her that wonderful period look.

I acquired 'NAE' in November 2016 from a dealer in Northwich, Cheshire.



I remember being seduced by how balanced and original she looked in the photo. Shortly after bringing her up to Ayrshire, she developed an annoying seizing trait which I immediately investigated. At some point, someone had fitted a high compression, short skirt piston, probably to try and gain an extra two or three horse power which didn't sit well with her. Although the piston had picked up on the rear, the cylinder just required a light honing and I replaced it with a correct, low compression, long skirt piston - she never looked back after that and has been one of the most reliable classics I've ever owned. In fact, with the advance/retard lever pulled right back she'll sit at an insanely slow tickover that seems to defy science!

In the middle of 2017, she got a 'Highly Commended' rosette at the 28th Classic Bike Show, Ayr Racecourse, which I was delighted to receive.



It was not long after that, a Velocette MAC 350 and a Velocette Valiant presented themselves which I couldn't resist. I reluctantly put 'NAE' on the market to raise the cash and off she went back home to her place of birth, Birmingham. I said to the chap who bought her, "if ever he was putting her up for sale to give me first refusal". And, three years later he rang me and said he was putting her on the market to raise cash for an expensive BSA DBD34 Goldstar which he'd had the chance to acquire. So, in 2020, back to Scotland, she came. I couldn't believe how lucky I was to have a second chance of ownership. From now on, she'll always remain a permanent fixture in my collection.

For a rigid frame with relatively primitive teles' up front, she's a remarkably sharp handling bike that holds her line through corners brilliantly. Coupled to a very tractable, torquey engine and well ratioed gearbox – she's an absolute delight in every sense!







31st Scottish Classic Motorcycle Show – an update

The second show committee meeting was held on the 15th November and the following items were raised / discussed.

The official flyer for the show has been agreed on. This is not the flyer that has been displayed on the club's Facebook page. The correct one is currently having additional wording and logos added to it and it will be issued shortly.

The additional logos are for the stunt rider: Graham Houston (Scottish Wheelie School) and the Dumfries & Galloway Blood Bikers who will be the charity beneficiary. We have also

asked them to provide representatives and the blood bike dedicated to Alan Shaw (former member) at the show.

The treasurer is investigating the use of hand-held card readers for the payment of entry fee which hopefully will reduce waiting time and the hassle of us dealing with change.

The web site will be updated so that both bike entries and traders can either submit their forms on line or download and post them. All previous exhibitors and traders will be notified of the show either by post or where possible e-mail.

To promote the show, we are considering returning to the Haggis Gathering, Lanark in February and the Scottish Motorcycle Show, Ingliston in March, but for both we will need volunteers to help man the stand. Further details and a request for help will be issued shortly.

Coffee Morning Run 16th November – Paul Wilkinson

The last coffee run of 2022 was held at the Puffers Café, Maritime Museum, Irvine. The café had been the winners of the Scottish Enterprise Small Café Award for 2021 and perhaps this explained the good turnout – 20 people were present. This number included the two Annes, (Brian and Ricky's wives), plus Hugh Adams. Hugh is not a member, but I am sure most of you will know him for selling classic motorcycles from his Kilmarnock garage. He did inform me that he had heard how good these gatherings were and had decided to check it out for himself. I believe he was suitably impressed.



I had suggested to the committee, back in April, that the club should consider arranging coffee runs for retired motorcyclists. This was because I had been attending a similar event arranged by the Trident & Rocket 3 Owners Club and I had thoroughly enjoyed meeting like-minded enthusiasts. The idea was to encourage a social gathering where people could meet and have a blether, plus because all of the venues have been in Ayrshire it was an opportunity for some of us to get our older classic motorcycles out.

To date we have met eight times at a selection of cafes that have all made us very welcome. In terms of number, the lowest turnout has been 10 and the highest 23. On every occasion a number of classic motorcycles have been present.

Although I had anticipated this just being a summer activity, members have requested that it continue each month and so it will. We will have a break in December, but will recommence on Wednesday 18th January 2023. Next year I hope to see many more of you at these gatherings.

Excellent trailer with additional Load Platform to facilitate carriage of non-motorcycle items. Has been used in the past with one or two large Tote Bags for disposal of garden waste, collection of logs etc. Plenty of tie-down hooks and also holes in the side angles for fixings.

Fitted bracket for spare wheel, which is included but will need a replacement tyre. There is a loading ramp for motorcycles which stows at the rear off-side.
